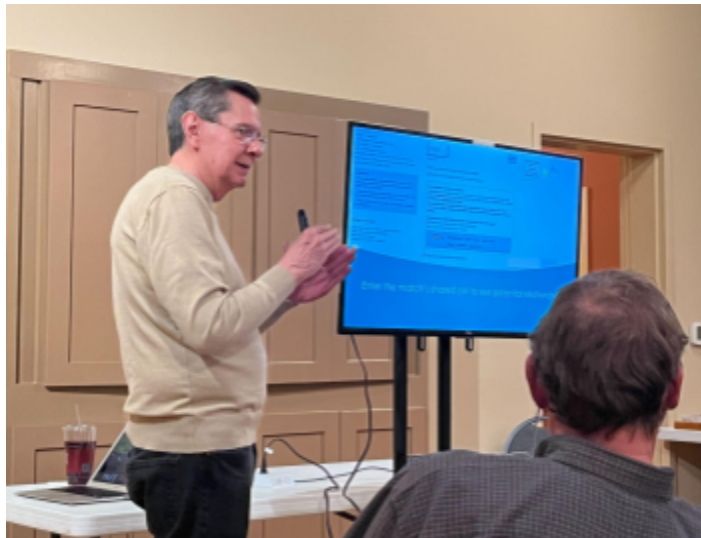
## Previous Meetings

### 11 February 2025 Meeting



Carlos Casteneda presented "Genealogy DNA: How to use it, and what to do with the results." Using examples from his own personal family research and DNA results, Carlos covered a number of topics including:

- Explained the composition of DNA.
- Reasons why genealogists should take a DNA test, and the potential drawbacks being added to a DNA database.
- Companies that offer DNA testing and he gave a comparison of the various differences, benefits and costs that differentiate companies.
- Explained what indicates the differences in related DNA between close and distant relationships.
- Reviewed how ancestry.com DNA format works in locating related family members and in terms of ethnic makeup.

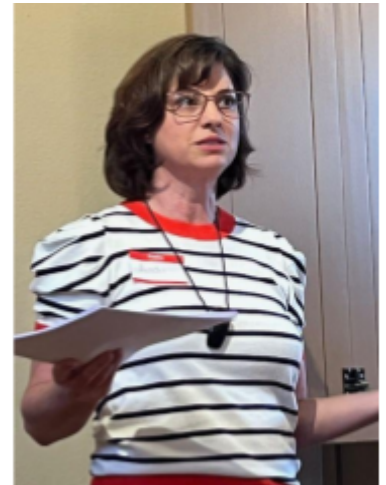
## 11 March 2025 Meeting



Andrea Stahman Burden presented "The Salge Family Cemetery." Andrea is a Senior Archaeologist at ICF Technologies in Austin. She gave an overview of the work at the Salge Family Cemetery and the process for relocating cemeteries in Texas. The Salge Family Cemetery is a historic cemetery located near Clear Springs. The presentation covered discovering, locating, & identifying unknown cemeteries and moving cemeteries to new locations. She illustrated these topics through her experience in locating and relocating the Salge Family Cemetery. Her presentation featured:

- The legal issues and steps required to relocate bodies to a new cemetery.
- The scientific and archeological issues involved in cemetery relocation.
- A step-by-step explanation of how they work with the families as they move the buried family members.

Several members of the Salge family attended the presentation.

Angela Breidenbach presented "Building Skills to Preserve Family History." In a first for CCGS, Angela presented remotely to the group. Angela is a published author specializing in historical fiction and creating books around a family narrative. She is also a dedicated genealogist and is the executive director for the International Institute of Genealogical Studies found at [GenealogicalStudies.com](https://www.genealogicalstudies.com).



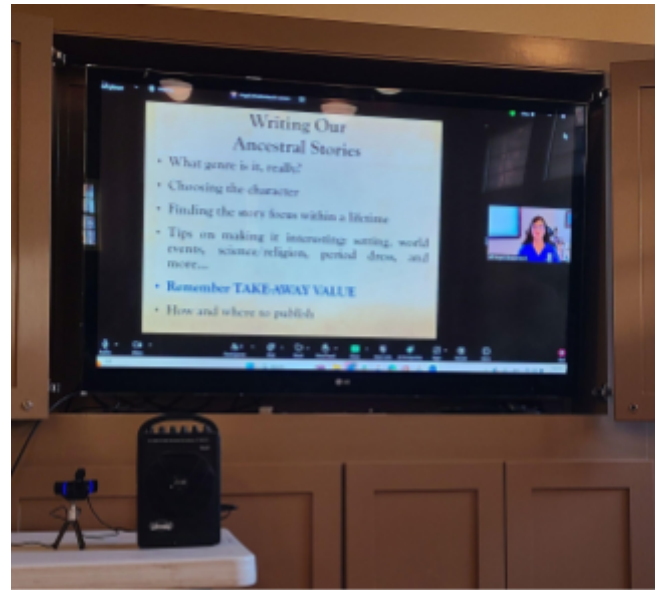
Her very informative talk addressed some basic starting points in creating narrative stories that focus on family members such as selecting an ancestor, and then focusing on a specific period of the ancestor's life. She touched on how to make your stories more interesting by inserting aspects that touch each of our five senses, as well as adding descriptives in dress, atmosphere, culture, etc. to help bring the story to life. She covered many additional aspects of the writing process including the options available for publication.

## *New Braunfels: The First Founders* Reprint

The definitive two volume set of *New Braunfels: The First Founders* by Everett Fey is out of print. There are no remaining original copies to be sold, and the publisher is no longer in business. The family of Everett Fey, the Sophienburg Archives, and the Comal County Genealogy Society (together the copyright owners) are collaboratively working to bring this classic back into print. CCGS members who have participated include Lynn Thompson, Tina LaFreniere, and Wendel Voigt. The following work has been done or planned to be done:

- ☒ An existing copy was sacrificed for scanning by having its binding removed.
- ☒ Both volumes have been scanned into PDF format (over 1000 pages!)
- ☐ Pictures used in the book were located in the Sophienburg and are planned to be scanned.
- ☐ The scanned pictures will be inserted into the PDF files. This will provide the best print picture quality.
- ☐ A new publisher/printer is being sought which can use the PDF files to produce the books.

Once a printer is selected, a definitive schedule and book price can then be set. It is hoped that the printer can then provide copies of the book "on demand" instead of needing to do a large (expensive) print run.

## CCGS Scholarship Awarded

Early in 2024, the Board of Directors discussed increasing CCGS' overall outreach and how to get young people interested in genealogy. Ultimately, the Board of Directors authorized a \$1000 scholarship to be awarded to a graduating 12th grader who attends a high school in Comal County (or any high school in Comal ISD or New Braunfels ISD, even if in an adjacent county).

A scholarship committee was formed consisting of Wendel Voigt, Simone Hierholzer, Vince Callier, Chris Parma, and Lynne' Voigt.

It was also decided that instead of asking applicants to submit an essay, they would instead submit a genealogy project. The project would include producing a

documented four generation Ancestor chart and providing a photo of a treasured object (photo, heirloom, or document) with a short description as well as a few sentences on why it is important to them.

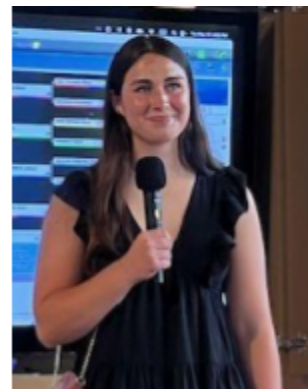
The scholarship application submission deadline was March 10, 2025. CCGS received a number of scholarship applications. Entries were received from across Comal County including applicants from Canyon Lake H.S., New Braunfels H.S., Canyon H.S., Davenport H.S., Smithson Valley H.S., New Braunfels Christian Academy, and St. John Paul II Catholic H.S..

The winner of the 2025 Comal County Genealogy Society Scholarship is

**Rylee Wunderlich** of Canyon Lake High School. This fall, she will be attending Texas A&M in College Station.

CCGS awarded her the scholarship at the May 13th meeting. In addition, Mark Olsen provided a complementary copy of 2024 Family Tree Maker to Rylee in recognition of her work.

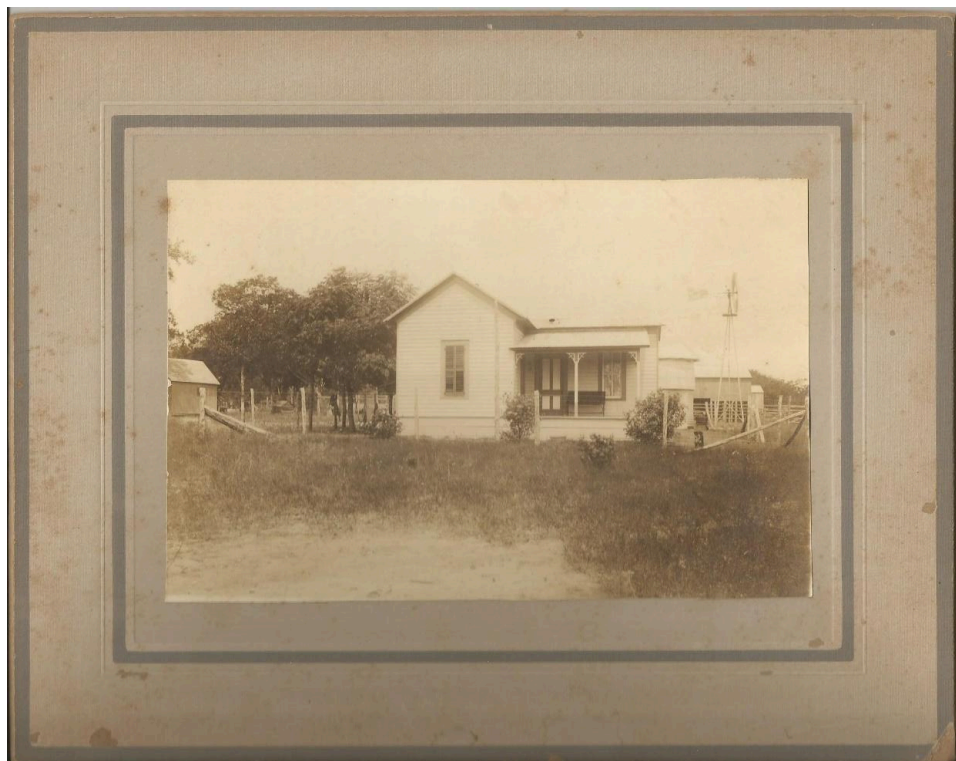

## Treasured Object



### Description

This photograph features the home of Hugo and Pauline Wunderlich, located in western Comal County (now considered Spring Branch) on the banks of Rebecca Creek and the Guadalupe River. The picture was taken in 1905 and includes the original home and various outbuildings including a cistern, smokehouse, and two barns (the second of which is partially hidden the barn nearer the house).

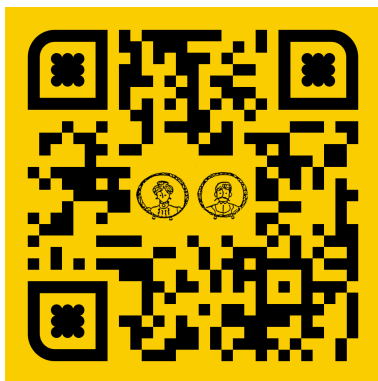
### Importance

This century old farmhouse, that has been in my family for generations, is where I've been raised. On the kitchen wall that once held the smokestack of the wood stove, hangs a small chalkboard that often holds sayings like "Hands to work. Hearts to God." or "Whatever you do, do it enthusiastically as something done for the Lord and not for man. – Colossians 3:23". These are more than simple words, they are a testament to the work ethic, faith, and family values held by my ancestors. My family continues the tradition of ranching by raising commercial beef cattle, while also caring for the land and buildings. The farmhouse has seen a few upgrades since the picture was taken in 1905, but it is still very modest. The house now boasts three bedrooms that are shared by our family of five. The outhouse still sits on the backside of the house, but the added bathroom is actually one of the largest rooms in the house. The windmill in the picture is still standing, but a submersible pump added shortly after my family moved into the house made it no longer necessary to plug in the well pump and set a timer to see that you didn't overflow the cistern. The cistern proved too unstable just a few years ago, leading to the addition of a concrete holding tank. The smokehouse on the left still stands and occasionally gets used to dry and smoke homemade deer sausage. The barn in the back still holds hay for livestock and show animals. Single pane windows, little insulation, pier and beam construction, and a lack of central heat and air makes the house cold in the winter and hot in the summer. However, my family generally spends enough time working outdoors that we aren't all that phased by it. I couldn't imagine having grown up any other way, and I'm so grateful for the lessons this house taught me that are so eloquently portrayed by the words on the chalkboard in the kitchen.
